Chiropractor giving back to remember fallen firefighter

Brookhaven business donates to help family of Nicholas Picozzi II.

BROOKHAVEN — Parkside and Lower Chichester fire trucks were parked outside Discover Chiropractic as the staff inside doled out free adjustments as a way to raise funds for a fallen firefighter.

Jason Weigner of Discover Chiropractic offered free services from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday in exchange for a \$10 donation for Lower Chichester firefighter Nicholas Picozzi II's family.

Picozzi died March 5 after fighting a house fire in the 100 block of Moser Avenue in Upper Chichester. The lieutenant and eight-year veteran with the Lower Chichester Volunteer Fire Co. left a wife and two sons.

"It was the least we could do to help out," Weigner said. "It's part of our way of giving back, whatever we can do to help the community."

Discover Chiropractic has four to five charity events a year for causes from autism to multiple sclerosis to cancer. But, this one had a special place in Weigner's heart.

A part of the Brookhaven community since 1996, Weigner has given free chiropractic services to police and firefighters since then.

On Aug. 11, 2007, two Parkside firefighters were seriously injured fighting an early-morning house fire in the Village at Green Tree complex.

Weigner said he was there that evening giving subluxations to responding personnel.

So, after the Upper Chichester fire occurred, he wanted to respond.

Weigner said firefighters and police officers are among those who give the most to the community and this was a way to thank them.

"What is raised, we match 100 percent," he said. "The more you give out, the more you receive."

Even customers got into the spirit of the event.

"It's a good cause," Ann Johnson of Parkside said. "It's worthwhile."

Although she's been coming for two years since her son, Jesse, had migraine headaches, she and her two children came Saturday just to support the Picozzi fund.

"Anybody that gives their life to their community deserves a hand," Johnson said.

During the day, along Edgmont Avenue, various vehicles beeped in support at the waving Elmo outside the chiropractic offices as children bounced in the inflatable

Even that, Weigner said, was a part of the benefit as J & L Entertainment told him to put the money toward renting it toward the Picozzi fund.

Lower Chichester fire officials were appreciative of Discover Chiropractic's effort.

"I think it's a great, great benefit," Chris Durbano, assistant chief for the Lower Chichester Fire Co., said. "It shows how much everybody cares."

Weigner said he expects to host a similar benefit for the Nicholas Picozzi fund at his Linwood office, Advanced Care Centers, in the next few weeks.
